- Β. **COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course is an introductory survey of the visual arts (painting, sculpture, architecture, decorative arts, and utilitarian objects) from prehistoric times through the fourteenth-century. We will examine works of art from both Western and non-Western civilizations. This course includes lectures, discussions, and student-led presentations.

- 1. Art History and its Methodologies
- 2. Earliest developments in the arts (Prehistory)
- 3. The art of early Bronze Age civilizations

- 5. The visual arts, of both Western and non-Western civilizations, from the Early Medieval period through the 14th century.

- 6. Describe the lives and work of individual artists, influences upon them, and their stylistic development.
- 7. Express informed personal responses to works of art in written papers and/ or class discussions.
- 8. Write critical and analytical essays using academic research and scholarship.
