- B. COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course focuses on the genre of women's autobiography and memoir. Students will read and analyze autobiographical accounts of women from different parts of the world. This writing-intensive course will examine how the various forms of autobiography and memoir have preserved history and culture of women from varied cultures, classes, religions, and ethnic groups. College level reading and writing skills are recommended.

  - 2. Theories of autobiography and memoir
