- В. COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course explores Native American life from diverse cultural and academic perspectives in both historical and contemporary terms. Students will learn about aspects of tribal life and history such as philosophy, spirituality, arts and literature, sovereignty, political life, education, and community. Collegelevel reading and writing required.

  - 1. Identify a variety of Native cultures and nations on the land known as the United States, including basic similarities and differences among them.
  - Examine works by Native Americans—including literary texts, translations, and transcribed oral histories, as well as songs, films, dances, and more—in order to develop awareness and understanding in historical and social contexts.
  - 3. Outline historical events, developments, and forces (including major laws, acts, and court decisions) affecting the relationships among Native nations and between them and the United States.
  - 4. Analyze social and economic relationships, along with related influences important to sovereign Native peoples over time, situating them in larger American and international contexts.
  - Explain various myths and misconceptions regarding Native Americans, historically and today, and explore more accurate representations.
  - Demonstrate understanding of contemporary issues, lifeways, and relationships important to Native Americans.
