- B. COURSE DESCRIPTION: A comparative study of music and its function within cultures of non-Western countries and various American folk traditions from a listener's point of view. Cultures surveyed come from India, Indonesia, China, Japan, Africa, Central/Eastern Europe and the Americas. No previous musical experience required. College level reading and writing skills are recommended.
